Karen Martin only joined Rathfarnham Theatre Group last year and we thought so much of her dress sense that we immediately wrapped her up in a sheet and put her on stage in *Chapter Two* in the role of Faye. She was so good that we then allowed her to play the part of a chimpanzee in our recent production of *Words, Words, Words*.



Niamh Ruiséal grew up in Cork but was cruelly run out because she refused to eat Crubeens. She then settled in Rathfarnham, where she joined the Theatre Group at its inception. She played in *Drama At Inish* before getting a two year reprieve from Cork, and last time out played the less than musically talented Joyce in *Last Tango in Rathfarnham*.



Catherine McAuliffe is also from Cork where she learned her Irish dancing. Unfortunately she forgot it all when she came to Dublin. Having played Ruth in Blithe Spirit and Gwendoline in The Importance Of Being Earnest, her expertise in cardboard box watching and tomato peeling made her an obvious choice for the part of Agnes in this play.



Rachael Stanley loves dancing in wellies - she's also a martial arts enthusiast and thus we were persuaded to cast her in this play. Formerly with Tallaght Choral Society and Little Dublin Singers, she joined us in 1994 and has previously played Edith in Blithe Spirit, as well as a number of roles in our workshop productions.



Carmel Cullen joined Rathfarnham Theatre Group to get away from Eamonn...then he joined. It's no wonder that roles like Big Maggie, Juno & Kate come so naturally to her. Despite her huge handicap (Eamonn), Carmel has also managed to turn in some more light hearted performances such as Olive in The Odd Couple, Jenny in Chapter Two and Margaret in Last Tango in Rathfarnham.



Mark Connolly turned down a chance to represent Ireland in television watching (heavyweight division) at the Olympics so that he could join Rathfarnham Theatre Group. He has appeared in many of our productions without causing too much damage. Last time out, Mark played a chimpanzee, so this production is a big step up the evolutionary ladder for him



Columb Casey doesn't want to be reminded that he started his acting career in the role of Mary in his schools' Easter passion play, so we won't mention it. He has had parts in several of our previous productions the directors of which are now well on the road to recovery.



Robert Massey learnt his craft in the Xavier Goodwin Drama School where he appeared as Tevye in Fiddler On The Roof and in numerous other shows during the eight years he spent there.

Moving on to U.C.D., he became one of the leading lights in Dramsoc, appearing in many of their plays and directing *The Cagebirds* to critical acclaim.

Since joining us last year, Rob has been a busy fellow having played the lecherous and dissolute Leo in *Chapter Two* (typecast), as well as directing and playing the part of a chimpanzee in *Words, Words, Words* (typecast again). This is Rob's first stint as director of a full length production for us - we all wish him well, and hope it's just the first of many.
